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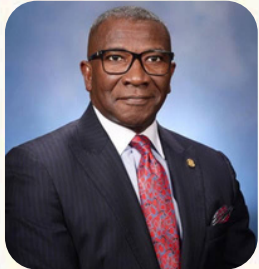

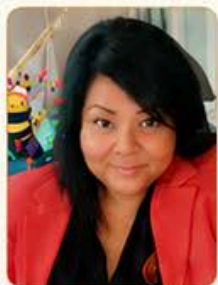

60 YEARS IN THE SPIRIT OF HOPE

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE SAGINAW COMMUNITY ACTION CENTER

1965 – Present

For sixty years, the Saginaw Community Action Center has stood in the difficult places where hope and hardship often meet. It was born during one of the most consequential periods in modern American history, the War on Poverty, when communities across the nation were challenged to confront inequality not simply with words, but with action. In 1965, as the nation wrestled with civil rights, economic instability, and growing demands for social justice, leaders in Saginaw understood that poverty was not merely a condition of income but also one of opportunity, access, and voice. From those earliest days operating out of borrowed spaces at UAW/CIO Local 699 and St. Rita's Catholic Church, the agency began building what would become one of the community's most enduring institutions of service, advocacy, and empowerment.

The founding of Community Action in Saginaw reflected a larger national movement, but its spirit was deeply local. The early years were marked by urgency, creativity, and a belief that residents themselves must play a role in shaping solutions for their neighborhoods. In 1966, citizen participation mandates were introduced, ensuring that the voices of ordinary residents remained central to the agency's mission. Legal Aid services began under the CAC umbrella, while medical outreach and emergency support programs responded to the immediate needs of families who often had nowhere else to turn.

The late 1960s brought some of the agency's most transformative achievements. In 1967, the nationally recognized Head Start Program was established under the CAC umbrella, affirming the belief that the fight against poverty must begin with children and families. Youth employment programs, work experience initiatives, and educational support services soon followed. Yet the agency's work extended beyond economics alone. Programs such as the Saginaw Black Arts Festival, the Sphinx Art Council, and various community organizations reflected a broader understanding that culture, identity, and civic participation were equally important in strengthening communities.

By the 1970s, the agency had evolved into something far larger than a social service provider. It became a community convener, a place where partnerships formed, ideas were debated, and grassroots leadership emerged. Programs addressing dental care, nutrition, senior services, transportation, housing, addiction recovery, and workforce development expanded rapidly to meet residents' changing needs.

One of the most enduring milestones came in 1975 with the launch of the Weatherization Program. What began as an effort to help families reduce energy costs during Michigan's harsh winters would grow into one of the agency's defining programs for decades to come. Thousands of residents would eventually benefit from energy-efficient home improvements, utility assistance, and housing stabilization services.

The 1980s and 1990s marked a period of institutional growth and stability. Commodity food distribution expanded dramatically, emergency assistance programs were strengthened, and housing counseling services became increasingly important as economic conditions shifted throughout the region. In 1984, the agency moved to its Perkins Street location, a moment that symbolized permanence and long-term investment in the community.

Leadership transitions during these years also helped shape the organization's direction. Dedicated board members, executive directors, volunteers, and frontline staff guided the CAC through changing political climates, funding structures, and community needs. The agency's ability to adapt while remaining mission-focused became one of its greatest strengths.

As the new century approached, the CAC continued modernizing its operations while responding to increasingly complex community challenges. Strategic planning initiatives expanded. Technology modernization improved service delivery. Housing counseling, tutoring programs, financial literacy initiatives, and family self-sufficiency programs reflected a growing recognition that poverty is often tied to education, trauma, housing instability, and generational inequities.

The years following 2009 brought some of the most visible demonstrations of the agency's impact. Through federal stimulus investments and weatherization funding under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, millions of dollars were invested in homes throughout Saginaw County. These investments not only improved housing conditions but also generated jobs, strengthened local contractors, and stabilized neighborhoods.

Then came 2020, a year that tested communities across the globe. When the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted daily life and deepened economic hardship for countless families, Community Action once again responded with urgency and compassion. Emergency assistance, food support, housing stabilization, and CARES funding became lifelines for residents facing uncertainty unlike anything seen in generations.

Under the leadership of Executive Director Hurley J. Coleman III, the agency entered a new chapter focused on renewal, modernization, and strategic growth. Significant ARPA investments helped support building renovations, emergency food response efforts, housing initiatives, and community development projects. The agency expanded food storage capacity, renovated facilities, strengthened partnerships, and continued positioning itself as both a service provider and a community anchor institution.

Today, the Saginaw Community Action Center enters its sixtieth year not simply as an organization, but as a living reflection of perseverance, advocacy, and hope. Across six decades, millions of dollars have been invested into neighborhoods, housing, emergency services, youth development, senior outreach, food security, and workforce initiatives.

History often remembers institutions by the buildings they occupied or the programs they operated. But the true history of Community Action in Saginaw is found in the people whose lives were changed: the child who entered Head Start prepared to learn, the senior who received emergency assistance during winter, the family who remained safely housed, or the resident who discovered that their voice mattered within the life of the community.

For 60 years, the work of Community Action has never been about programs alone. It has been about preserving dignity, restoring possibility, and reminding an entire community that hope becomes most powerful when it is placed into action.

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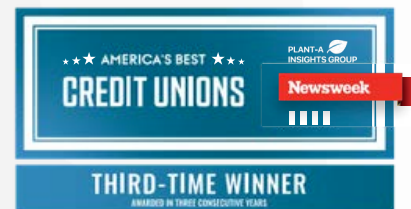

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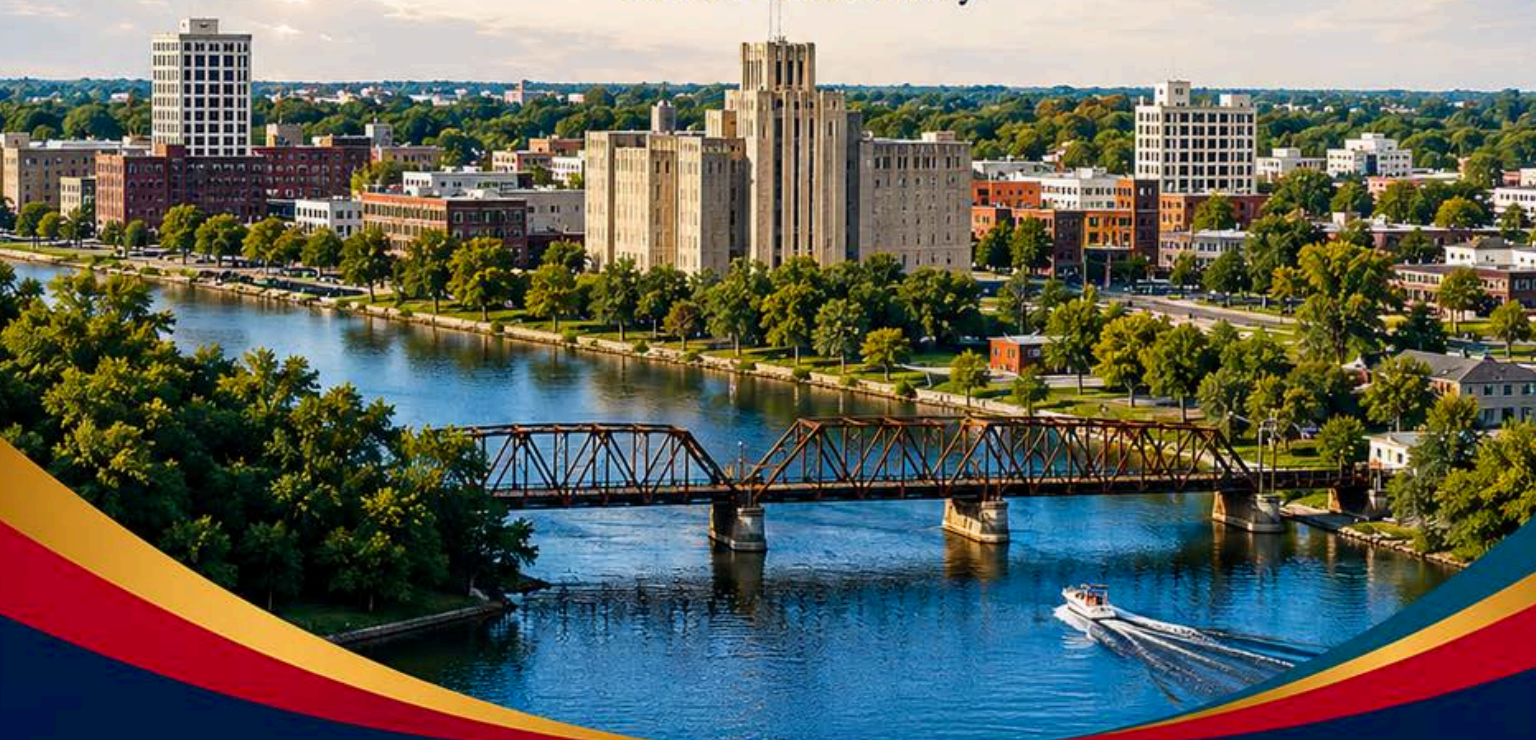
